# Rebecca Solnit, Men Explain Things to Me, 2014

Coining it 'mansplaining', Solnit writes about men who wrongly assume they know things and wrongly assume women don't, about why this arises, and how this aspect of the gender wars works, airing some of their own hilariously awful encounters.

# Vandana Shiva & Maria Mies, *Ecofeminism*, 2014

These two authors groundbreakingly argue that ecological destruction and industrial catastrophes constitute a direct threat to everyday life, the maintenance of which has been made the particular responsibility of women.

# Silvia Rivera Cusicanqi, *Discourses of Decolonization*, 2012

With a series of personal examples, Rivera explores the possibilities for decolonization through an analysis of the "multicultural" state as an ongoing practice of coloniality that

recognizes and incorporates indigenous people but only as static, archaic figures defined by a continuous relationship to an idealized past.

#### Heather Davis, *Plastic Progeny*, 2015

A cool read by an even so important thinker on the anthropocene, that kicks off with the story of the find of a dildo inside a stranded whale. They also gave a great short lecture on decolonizing the anthropocene <u>HERE</u> (skip first 15' of thank yous)

## bell hooks, *Feminism is for Everybody*, 2000

With her customary insight and unsparing honesty, hooks calls for a feminism free from divisive barriers but rich with rigorous debate, to be read by all genders. In language both eye-opening and optimistic, hooks encourages us to demand alternatives to patriarchal, racist, and homophobic culture, and to imagine a different future.

## Virginie Despentes, King Kong Theory, 2006

'French Feminist Pulp That Spares No Pain' said the New York Times. Drawing from personal experience, Despentes shatters received ideas about rape and prostitution, and explodes common attitudes towards sex and gender.

## Paul B. (Beatriz) Preciado, Testo Junkie, 2008

This text is about the synthesis of hormones and how since the 1950s has fundamentally changed how gender and sexual identity are formulated, and how the pharmaceutical and pornography industries are in the business of creating desire.

# Roxane Gay, Bad Feminist, 2014

Roxane Gay is a writer, a Haitian-American, a bisexual, and a feminist — albeit a self-proclaimed bad one. They say her journey to identify as a feminist has evolved over time. #### Virginia Woolf, <u>A Room Of One's Own</u>, 1929

Woolf addressed the status of women, and women artists in particular, in this famous essay, which asserts that a woman must have money and a room of her own if she is to write. Independence y'all!

#### Katie Roiphe, *Elect Sister Frigidaire* (from: In Praise of Messy Lives), 2012

On why we collectively hate Hillary Clinton, who in many ways incarnates the feminist dream, the opportunity made flesh, the words we whisper to little girls: 'You can be president. You can do anything you want.'"

#### Legacy Russel, Glitch Feminism, 2020

Glitch Feminism is a vital new chapter in cyberfeminism, one that explores the

relationship between gender, technology and identity. In an urgent manifesto, Russell reveals the many ways that the glitch performs and transforms: how it refuses, throws shade, ghosts, encrypt, mobilises and survives.

#### Laboria Cuboniks, Xenofeminism Manifesto, 2014

Laboria Cuboniks (b. 2014) is a xenofeminist collective, spread across five countries and three continents. She seeks to dismantle gender, destroy 'the family,' and do away with nature as a guarantor for inegalitarian political positions. Her name is an anagram of 'Nicolas Bourbaki', a pseudonym under which a group of largely French mathematicians worked towards an affirmation of abstraction, generality and rigour in mathematics in the early twentieth century. Members include Diann Bauer, Katrina Burch, Lucca Fraser, Helen Hester, Amy Ireland, and Patricia Reed.
